Letter from the Board Chair



Dear Members of the Community and CESC Supporters,

Our clients have endured many challenges since our last annual report in 2019. I'm pleased to share that over the last year, we continued to adapt Connecting Everyone with Second Chances in directions that best serve our community members in poverty.

As of July 2021, management of The Dwellings and Westgate were transitioned to Royal American Management. The Kearney Center and CESC Health Services remain the core focus of CESC. Through The Kearney Center and CESC Health Services, we continue to provide emergency shelter, food, case management, free healthcare, and more to those experiencing homelessness.

The onset of the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020 was a shock to all. Thanks to community support we persevered, kept our clients safe, and in January 2022, CESC Health Services was approved to administer vaccinations to our clients and the public. Though it feels like we've made it out of the fog, there will always be obstacles to overcome. CESC will always find the best solution to protect our most vulnerable neighbors.

Through the pandemic, our clients' lives became even more difficult with rising costs of living, and other concerns that make homelessness a convoluted problem in the Big Bend region. CESC is ensuring we can guide them to a self-sufficient future, including placement into transitional and permanent housing. As you continue reading this annual report, you will see we have expanded our diversion services at The Kearney Center, launched a new outreach program, and developed an Enrichment Center program to address mental health issues and provide sustainability courses.

Thank you to our partners, supporters, donors, volunteers, staff, and board members for helping CESC get through challenging times. As we reflect on the past year, we have made terrific progress and increased stability for all. Our progress wouldn't be possible without community support. Thank you SO MUCH for your participation in that success!

What We Do

Founded in 2015, CESC is the parent organization of The Kearney Center and CESC Health Services. We help lead those experiencing homelessness or economic hardship in the Big Bend region to an independent, sustainable future by providing food, shelter, job placement services, case management, free medical and dental care, and so much more.









The Kearney Center is a 24-hour comprehensive emergency service center for individuals experiencing homelessness or economic hardship in the North Florida region. As a point of entry into assistance, The Kearney Center first provides the basic necessities such as a warm shower, hot meal, clean clothes, and a bed to sleep in. Since there is no one path to self-sufficiency, our case management team works with each client to connect them with permanent housing and resources at an appropriate time.

The Kearney Center has 27 partner agencies that visit weekly to provide clients with services such as job placement, identification assistance, education, food stamp access, and more. We are a one-stop shop for those in poverty thanks to our community partners!

In 2022, The Kearney Center expanded its services with the following programs:

Kearney on the Go

Outreach program

The Enrichment Center

Offers services and courses to clients that promote self-sufficiency and sustainability

Kearney Center Garden

On-site fruit and vegetable garden that allows our kitchen to serve meals with homegrown produce



CLIENT SUCCESS EDWARD'S STORY

Edward struggled with health issues that prevented him from staying employed and ultimately led him to homelessness. During the few months he stayed at The Kearney Center, Edward worked with our case management team to find affordable, permanent housing and get connected with resources to ensure a sustainable future. He was resilient through the housing process, and after receiving financial assistance to cover the first month of rent, he was able to move into a new place to call home.




Financial Report
